President McGinley welcomed students from the College of DuPage who are attending the meeting for course credit.

E. Presentation

1. Executive Director Dawn Bussey will give an update on the Glen Ellyn Public Library.

Glen Ellyn Library Executive Director Dawn Bussey presented an update on the Glen Ellyn Public Library. Ms. Bussey thanked the Village and Public Works for installing

lights on the Prairie Path by the Library. Ms. Bussey reviewed 2019 and talked about the Check the Library Campaign, the Short-Story Kiosk and the Gizmo Collection. Ms. Bussey stated the Library does serve over 80 book clubs in the community. Ms. Bussey stated in 2019, the Library has also done the Summer Reading Program, Goat Yoga and Summer Lunches. Ms. Bussey stated in 2020, the Library will go fine-free on the daily fines, and as of April, the hours of service on Friday and Sunday would be extended another hour. Ms. Bussey introduced Library Trustees Molly Hoerster, Karen Volk and Molly McGinnis Knapke who were attending the meeting as well.

Regarding Item #7, Trustee Senak asked what the total unfunded liability is. Finance Director Coyle stated she did not have the exact number with her, but as the Police Pension Fund is a bit over 50% funded, this is approximately \$24 million to \$25 million.

- G. **Glen Ellyn Metra Station Architectural Services and Phase I Engineering Agreement Change Order (Presented by Professional Engineer Daubert) (Trustee Thompson)**

Professional Engineer Daubert presented information on this change order and stated this change order is needed to authorize additional services to move the project forward with Section 106, coordination with the CBD Streetscape and Utilities project, type size and location drawings, expanded geotechnical and environmental work, additional project support, additional grant applications, external communications and project

management. Professional Engineer Daubert stated the amendment would result in an addition of up to 843 hours at a cost of \$154,175.

Trustee Senak asked for an update on the grant proposals. Professional Engineer Daubert stated the Village should receive notification this week about getting a grant from CMAP for approximately \$14 million. Professional Engineer Daubert stated the Village will be applying for a grant from the ICC as well which would be a reimbursement type. Professional Engineer Daubert stated the latest cost estimate on the overall project is a little over \$20 million.

Trustee Christiansen thanked Professional Engineer Daubert and team for their work on this project. Trustee Christiansen asked about the feedback from the State Preservation Officer. Professional Engineer Daubert stated in the end, they did look at saving the existing train station, but this was not looked at as feasible. Professional Engineer Daubert stated this will be continued to be look at concurrently with the design of the project. President McGinley stated she verified with the state that the Village Board has full authority over demolition of any building.

H. Zoning Text Amendments for Cannabis Business Establishments (Presented by Community Development Director Springer) (Trustee Enright)

President McGinley introduced this topic and explained the process.

Community Development Director Springer stated there are pages of additional resources in the Trustees' packet on this. Community Development Director Springer introduced Attorney Kurt Asprooth who is extremely knowledgeable about the cannabis act. Community Development Director Springer thanked Village Planner Purvis and Associate Village Planner Jackson for their work on this project.

Community Development Director Springer stated in June 2019, Governor Pritzker signed the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (CRTA) which legalizes the sale, possession and use of cannabis for recreational purposes in limited quantities by persons 21 years or older, beginning January 1, 2020. Community Development Director Springer stated municipalities may regulate or ban recreational cannabis in their jurisdictions, but municipalities cannot direct the licensing process which will be handled by the State. Community Development Director Springer stated the Village approved a medical cannabis text amendment in 2014; however, there are no medical cannabis dispensaries in the Village currently.

Community Development Director Springer reviewed the timeline of the discussions on possible recreational cannabis in the Village from the Village Board Workshop in August, to the Resolution passed by the Village Board in September to direct the Plan Commission to review and recommend to the Plan Commission public hearing on October 10th. Community Development Director Springer stated at the Plan Commission public hearing, the Plan Commission voted with six (6) yes votes and two (2) no votes to support the proposed text amendments as presented by the staff at this meeting; however,

it was the consensus of the Plan Commission that more information is needed prior to allowing the operation of recreational cannabis businesses in the Village. Community Development Director Springer stated the Plan Commission was in favor of the Village waiting to see what the impact is on other communities to help increase the level of confidence in making the right decision for the community.

Community Development Director Springer stated feedback and comments from the community were welcomed on the Village's website, and as to date, 58% of respondents were opposed to recreational cannabis businesses in the Village, 40% are in favor and 2% are undecided.

Community Development Director Springer reviewed the staff's research on recreational cannabis and stated the staff talked with a Cannabis Educator, did a literature review, attended a meeting at the College of DuPage, did a survey of other communities and did map studies as well. Community Development Director Springer stated there is not a lot of conclusive data from states that have legalized recreational cannabis, and a summary of the State of Colorado report was included in the Trustees' packets. Community Development Director Springer stated the staff did survey other communities and found that 45% of communities were taking action to allow recreational cannabis, 36% were taking action to ban recreational cannabis, 15% are undecided and 3% were going to put the topic on referendum.

Community Development Director Springer stated if the Village Board's decision is to allow recreational cannabis sales in Glen Ellyn, staff is supportive of text amendments that would allow recreational cannabis dispensaries only in the C3 zoning district with the following restrictions:

- That cannabis dispensaries be allowed as a special use only in the C3 zoning district (which is along Roosevelt Road).*
- That no consumption of cannabis on-site at dispensaries or smoking lounges be permitted.*
- That dispensaries be located no closer than 1,500 feet from a school.*
- That drive-through and window sales be prohibited.*
- That parking requirements be the same as other retail uses (1 space per 250 gross square feet).*
- That a traffic impact study be required as part of the special use application.*
- That all cannabis dispensaries be required to submit a site plan as part of the special use application and that the Village may impose additional setbacks, landscaping, screening and buffering requirements to mitigate impacts on surrounding properties.*
- That cannabis dispensaries shall submit a plan for the control of cannabis odors from the subject property as part of the special use application.*
- That the number of dispensaries be limited through the use of licenses, similar to liquor licenses.*
- That no other type of cannabis related businesses, other than dispensaries, be allowed to locate within the Village at this time.*

Trustee Enright asked if there has been any interest on dispensaries coming to Glen Ellyn. Village Manager Franz stated the staff has had some conversations from some potential business owners.

Trustee Fasules asked if anyone can come to the Village and file for a text amendment to allow a special use to which Community Development Director Springer stated they can. President McGinley stated this would be a multi-month process. Attorney Asprooth stated there could be a concern with the Village Board not making a decision so to avoid ambiguity, he would recommend the Village Board makes a decision one way or another. President McGinley asked if the Village Board can control where cannabis businesses can be in the Village with zoning regulations to which Attorney Asprooth stated they can.

Trustee Enright asked about the financial and tax estimates. Finance Director Coyle stated in her estimation, the best estimate in tax revenue from recreational cannabis sales with the full 3% sales tax could be in the range of \$100,000 to \$400,000 to the Village. Trustee Senak asked if the Village can prohibit the sale of edibles if the edibles resemble candy, cookies or other things. Attorney Asprooth stated the Village cannot regulate what a dispensary can sell as the State regulates this.

Public Comment

Michelle Andringa, who resides at 708 Highview Avenue, stated she is strongly opposed to the sale of recreational cannabis in the Village as this will drive up crime and this industry is hard to police. Ms. Andringa stated allowing recreational cannabis would be irresponsible and dangerous as there is a difference between creating rules and enforcing rules. Ms. Andringa stated the Glen Ellyn Police Department is opposed to recreational cannabis in the Village. Ms. Andringa stated this will invite the black market to town. Ms. Andringa stated this would send the wrong message to the kids in the Village.

Gilda Ross, who resides at 80 Sunset, thanked the Village Board for their service. Ms. Ross stated she is attending the meeting on behalf of Dr. David Larson, Superintendent of District 87. Ms. Ross stated there could be numerous, long-term issues for marijuana users, and this could help with taxes in the Village, but will not help in the long-term. Ms. Ross stated the Village Board should consider a wait and see approach. Ms. Ross read a statement from the Glenbard West High School Principal.

JB Bledsas, who resides at 557 Glendale Avenue, stated he is representing Reality Illinois. Mr. Bledsas stated Glen Ellyn should opt out of recreational cannabis. Mr. Bledsas provided data and stated many teens have said that there is no issue with using marijuana one to two times a week. Mr. Bledsas stated with this low perception, there will be high risk.

Anne Gould, who resides at 609 Newton, asked why the Village would allow cannabis businesses to make a profit in the Village and why the Village would go against the Glen Ellyn Police Department and local educators who are against recreational cannabis. Ms. Gould asked what the Village's compelling reasons are to allow recreational cannabis in the Village. Ms. Gould stated Illinois was the first state to allow cannabis without bringing the issue to the voters. Ms. Gould stated it would be irresponsible to allow cannabis sales in the Village.

Steve Coffey, who resides at 206 East Road, stated it would be a bad idea to allow the sale of cannabis in the Village. Mr. Coffey stated Colorado is already showing bad long-term effects from cannabis. Mr. Coffey stated the Village Board should vote against this now and in the future.

Richard Schmitt, who resides at 672 Highview, asked the Village Board to vote no on this. Mr. Schmitt stated he is the father of a teenager and leads boys in the Boy Scouts. Mr. Schmitt stated there is already a crisis going on with vaping. Mr. Schmitt stated the Village Board should not give in to money.

Jason Fues, who resides at 620 Prairie, stated there are so many people in so many towns, standing up to say no to this. Mr. Fues stated the number 1 offense in Colorado schools is marijuana use, and the revenue targets in Colorado are supposedly not as good as the projections. Mr. Fues stated he thinks this would be a bad idea because if you look at the trends and indicators, these do not look good. Mr. Fues stated the Village should side with Naperville, Downers Grove, Lisle and Wheaton and say no on this.

Tim Meinhart, who resides at 167 Derby Glen Drive, stated the Village should opt out of this. Mr. Meinhart stated he has a family member in law enforcement in Colorado, and the family member says it is not great. Mr. Meinhart stated he does not see the point in allowing recreational cannabis sales, and no amount of tax revenue can make this right.

Carol Orosz, who resides at 460 Hill Avenue, stated she moved to Glen Ellyn because it is a safe town with low crime rates and is a wholesome community. Ms. Orosz stated

there might be some revenue from the sales, but the hospitals and police department will do extra work. Ms. Orosz stated the Village Board should consider all the risks and vote no.

Patrick Ryan, who resides at 539 Dawes Avenue, stated there is no much unknown on this issue, and there has been only a few months to consider this major item. Mr. Ryan stated there is no field test for marijuana. Mr. Ryan stated DuPage County will do a tax too. Mr. Ryan stated the Village Board should vote no.

Molly Hoerster, who resides at 345 Ridgewood, stated she is representing herself and not as a Trustee for the Library. Ms. Hoerster stated she is vehemently opposed to this. Ms. Hoerster stated she tries to deliver the right messages to her kids, and this is a moral issue. Ms. Hoerster stated there is already an alcohol issue in the community, and they should not introduce another element like this. Ms. Hoerster stated there is overwhelming evidence of various problems with marijuana use, and it would be highly irresponsible to allow this in the Village.

Pete Ladesic, who resides at 615 Scott Avenue, asked if Glen Ellyn need or want retail marijuana businesses in the community. Mr. Ladesic stated they would not even be having this discussion if it was not for money. Mr. Ladesic stated it is unfortunate that the downstate legislators put this in the Village's hands. Mr. Ladesic stated at the Village Board Workshop, those who were in favor were in favor of medical marijuana facilities, but that is not what this discussion is. Mr. Ladesic stated many across Illinois have opposed this, and this is not an economic development driver. Mr. Ladesic stated there is no rush to take action on this.

Amy Crowley, who resides at 580 Hillside Avenue, stated they should ban recreational cannabis sales in the Village. Ms. Crowley stated the struggle with vaping is real, and marijuana consumption would increase more risk. Ms. Crowley stated Glen Ellyn is a family-friendly Village, and this would be negated if the Village Board allowed cannabis. Gavin Schilling, who resides at 655 Duane Street, stated he is with Reality Illinois. Mr. Schilling provided data on vaping and stated people who do vaping have also reported a history of use of THC products.

Justine Rozenich, who resides at 67 Joyce Court, stated she is with Reality Illinois. Ms. Rozenich stated the Village Board should adopt a moratorium and address this issue in another year. Ms. Rozenich stated the Village Board should take a step back and look at possible issues in other communities from recreational cannabis.

Zack Wilson, who resides at 1N109 Wheatberry in Carol Stream, Illinois, presented information he found online and in article about a study done. Mr. Wilson stated the data shows a reduction in crime near dispensaries. Mr. Wilson provided data.

Dirk Andringa, who resides at 708 Highview, stated Glen Ellyn is a safe town, and he does not want to see the family atmosphere in Glen Ellyn destroyed. Mr. Andringa stated this will send the wrong message. Mr. Andringa stated in California, the profits have gone down because the black market cuts prices.

Kane Tran stated the Village should ban this if they feel they have enough monies to finance the schools and the community. Mr. Tran stated you need to look at both sides and see which could be more beneficial to the community. Mr. Tran stated violence occurs when there is drinking involved or other drugs. Mr. Tran stated he feels they should do a bit more research.

Megan Clifford, who resides at 793 Forest Avenue, stated she is in support of Police Chief Norton and the Glen Ellyn Police Department. Ms. Clifford stated there was a letter from the Glen Ellyn Police Department that laid out their concerns about allowing recreational cannabis in the Village. Ms. Clifford stated she agrees with the consensus statement from the Plan Commission, and the time, research and evidence are not there yet to make a decision on this.

Rudy Fan stated there are too many unknowns. Mr. Fan stated Glen Ellyn has a good reputation. Mr. Fan stated this is a cash-based business, and there are too many risks

involved. Mr. Fan stated the Village should wait and see how other communities handle this.

Tom Anderson, who resides at 554 Whittier Avenue, stated he can understand why Lombard allowed this, but he cannot understand why Glen Ellyn is. Mr. Anderson stated it does make any sense to talk about this, and he is disappointed that they are even talking about this.

President McGinley thanked the public for speaking at tonight's meeting. President McGinley stated she did want residents to know that the Village Board will be talking about a retail shop, and the Board did not talk discuss revenue first. President McGinley stated she wanted to get the pulse of the Village Board before going forward with a motion.

Trustee Fasules stated the Village Board cannot make a rash decision on this, and he feels they should table this ordinance for a length of time to properly study recreational cannabis sales so the Board can see the pros and cons.

Trustee Pryde stated he does not see a need to rush to make a judgment at this point. Trustee Pryde stated he is more against this than for this at this point. Trustee Pryde stated the Village Board should study this.

Attorney Asprooth stated the Village Board can set a moratorium with a specific time frame that would go through a Zoning Text Amendment.

Trustee Senak stated he thinks this was a bad law at the state level, but he also does not see that eliminating recreational cannabis sales will prohibit bad effects if this is legal at the State level. Trustee Senak stated he is fine with studying this, but he does support this as the revenue from the sales tax could go toward the Police Pension Liability and fully staffing the Glen Ellyn Police Department.

Trustee Enright stated based on resident outcry and feedback, he is opposed to this currently; however, he is fine with a moratorium for now.

Trustee Thompson stated he is conflicted in making this decision, and he received a lot of input. Trustee Thompson stated the Village Board does not have enough information to understand the effects on public health and safety. Trustee Thompson stated the tax revenue could possibly go into social programs. Trustee Thompson stated he is not ready to support this at this time, but he does support a wait and see approach as well as a Village-wide referendum on this. Trustee Thompson stated if this does pass, they should limit the license to only one recreational cannabis dispensary in the Village.

Trustee Christiansen thanked the staff, Police Chief Norton and the Plan Commission for their work on this already. Trustee Christiansen stated she is struggling with this as many people are suffering from things that are not covered by medical marijuana, and this would give these people access for those who do not qualify for a medical marijuana card. Trustee Christiansen stated for every statistic, there is an equal statistic to the contrary. Trustee Christiansen stated the Village could possibly lose substantial tax revenue and a possible access to marijuana for friends and neighbors that might need this. Trustee Christiansen stated she is leaning toward yes on this, but she is not opposed to further research.

President McGinley stated the consensus of the Village Board is to put a moratorium on this and do more research on recreational cannabis sales.

I. Public Hearing and First Reading of the Proposed Annual Budget for the Village of Glen Ellyn in the Net Amount of \$77,387,244 for the Fiscal Year Beginning January 1, 2020 (Presented by Finance Director Coyle) (Trustee Fasules)

1. Motion to open Public Hearing to receive comment on the proposed annual budget for the Village of Glen Ellyn in the net amount of \$77,387,244 for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2020 and ending December 31, 2020.

A motion was made by Trustee Fasules and seconded by Trustee Enright to open a Public Hearing at 9:20 p.m. to receive comment on the proposed annual budget for the Village of Glen Ellyn in the net amount of \$77,387,244 for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2020 and ending December 31, 2020.

Upon roll call, Trustees Christiansen, Enright, Fasules, Pryde, Senak and Thompson voted "aye."

Finance Director Coyle was sworn in and stated the draft budget is available on the Village's website, and hard copies of the draft budget are available at the Civic Center as well. Finance Director Coyle reviewed the timeline for the budget and stated this is the First Reading with the Second Reading being done at the November 12, 2019 Village Board Meeting. Finance Director Coyle stated the 2020 Budget covers the 17 Funds of the Village. Finance Director Coyle stated the additional cost to the average resident of the Village will be \$9.56 in 2020 for the 2020 Budget. Finance Director Coyle stated the General Fund is balanced for 2020.

Trustee Senak asked about the merit pool for Village employees. Finance Director Coyle stated this is a 2.75% merit pool, and staff directors are given the option to give a base salary adjustment to their employees or a 1-time stipend. There was a discussion on how 2.75% was figured for the merit pool. Trustee Senak asked they would need to lower the budget by approximately \$100,000 in order to zero the levy to which Finance Director Coyle stated yes.

J. Public Hearing and First Reading of the Proposed 2019 Property Tax Levy for the Village of Glen Ellyn and the Glen Ellyn Public Library (Presented by Finance Director Coyle) (Trustee Fasules)

1. Motion to open public hearing to receive comment on the proposed 2019 property tax levy for the Village of Glen Ellyn and the Glen Ellyn Public Library.

A motion was made by Trustee Fasules and seconded by Trustee Enright to open a Public Hearing at 9:35 p.m. to receive comment on the proposed 2019 property tax levy for the Village of Glen Ellyn and the Glen Ellyn Public Library.

Upon roll call, Trustees Christiansen, Enright, Fasules, Pryde, Senak and Thompson voted "aye."

Finance Director Coyle was sworn in. Finance Director Coyle stated the Village of Glen Ellyn levy will include a 1.9% increase in CPI and a 0.9% increase in new growth. Finance Director Coyle stated 6.7% of the property tax levy goes to the Village and 34.3% of the levy goes to the Library so \$0.07 of every dollar goes to the Village with \$0.04 of every dollar going to the Library. Finance Director Coyle stated any abatements will be considered and voted on by the Village Board in January 2020.

Pete Ladesic, who resides at 615 Scott, was sworn in. Mr. Ladesic stated he encourages the Village Board to be flat on the property tax levy.

2. Motion to close a public hearing to receive comment on the proposed 2019 property tax levy for the Village of Glen Ellyn and the Glen Ellyn Public Library.

A motion was made by Trustee Fasules and seconded by Trustee Pryde to close a Public Hearing at 9:40 p.m. to receive comment on the proposed 2019 property tax levy for the Village of Glen Ellyn and the Glen Ellyn Public Library.

3. Motion to approve the first reading of an Ordinance for the levy and assessment of taxes in the amount of \$14,504,066 for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2020 and ending December 31, 2020, of the Village of Glen Ellyn and the Glen Ellyn Public Library

Trustee Senak stated he feels they can zero the levy if they can find approximately \$100,000 in cuts.
