F. NEW BUSINESS

- a. *Glen Ellyn Historic Preservation 2019 Awards* – Staff Liaison Jackson presents the award nominations for 2019 to the HPC. The information provided included the submission forms along with before and after pictures of the properties nominated. There were 7 project nominations that were received. They are as follows:
 - 205 Crest Road - Remodel of the Year
 - 684 Grand Ave - Remodel of the Year
 - 655 Pleasant Ave - Remodel of the Year
 - 388 N. Montclair Ave - Remodel of the Year
 - 689 Lake Road – Architectural Details

431 Carleton Ave – Restoration of the Year
680 Grand Ave - Restoration of the Year

The HPC reviewed the above properties and guidelines for each award category. Chairman Loftus asks if we can move properties to different award categories. Staff Planner Purvis replies yes you may. After viewing the award categories and homes; the HPC decides to move 655 Pleasant Ave and 205 Crest Road from Remodel of the Year category to Streetscape Compatibility category.

The HPC reviews all the Remodel of the Year properties and awards properties 684 Grand Ave and 388 Montclair Ave with Remodel of the Year Awards. An honorable mention to 680 Grand Avenue.

The HPC reviews the Streetscape Compatibility award nominations. After discussion the HPC awards 655 Pleasant Avenue with the Streetscape Compatibility award and 205 Crest Road & 680 Grand Avenue with honorable mentions.

The HPC reviews the Restoration of the Year nominations and awards 431 Carleton Ave with the Restoration of the Year Award and 680 Grand Avenue with an honorable mention.

The HPC reviews the Architectural Details award nominations and awards 689 Lake Road with the Architectural Details Award.

Chairman Loftus adds this is the first time we have had one property receive 3 honorable mentions. The property at 680 Grand Avenue receives honorable mentions over 3 award categories for Restoration, Remodel and Streetscape Compatibility.

Commissioner Sallwasser motions to accept the awards as discussed; Commissioner Darga seconds the motion.

- H. **HISTORICAL SOCIETY BUSINESS** – Executive Director Hall reports that with COVID-19 the museum can open in phase 4, however given the size of the rooms we cannot open and social distance, so we will reopen in phase 5. The History center is still working on flood recovery. We are hoping to reopen in late August/September. We are still working out social distancing guidelines. Many groups will start their meetings in September but will be limited to 50 people. The gift shop is open. It is operating half the amount of the hours. We are reassessing our fall programs and seeing what we can safely offer and what we can do in rentals.
- I. **CHAIRMAN REPORT** – Chairman Loftus asks the HPC if we want to consider pushing our boathouse event back to October. Staff Planner Jackson adds we have not rebooked the boathouse. We will postpone this event to next year.
- J. **VILLAGE BOARD TRUSTEE REPORT** – Trustee Enright reports that the village staff has done a great job getting through COVID-19 and helping businesses. The building at 425 Main Street has been torn down. There will be an access between the parking garage and Main Street. The McChesney site went to the plan commission for preauthorization for that site only to build apartments and shopping. The Avere project is moving along and is framed out to the top floor.
- K. **STAFF REPORT** – Associate Planner Jackson reports the next Village board meeting is July 27th.
- L. **ADJOURNMENT & NEXT MEETING DATE** - A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Commissioner Hood and second by Commissioner Darga. The meeting was adjourned at 8:43 p.m.

Overview & History

The Glen Ellyn Historic Preservation Commission (“Commission”) has many responsibilities in the Village. The Commission, under the original name Historical Sites Commission, was established in 1975 via Ordinance No. 1944 for the general welfare of the citizens of the Village to protect and encourage the continued utilization of areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other similar objects within the Village, including “Stacy’s Tavern”, eligible for designation by ordinance as Glen Ellyn Landmarks.

The Commission’s intent and purpose has further evolved to include additional responsibilities. The Commission hosts an annual awards program that aims to recognize

homeowners, builders, and architects for outstanding construction or enhancements in the Village. Awards are given for renovations, remodels, streetscape compatibility (new construction) and architectural details.

A third responsibility that the Commission has undertaken is assisting with architectural resource surveys within the Village. Since 2002, the Village has undergone five independent surveys that have collectively inventoried over 4,550 residential and commercial properties.

In addition to these responsibilities, the Commission has also hosted several community events designed to educate property owners on landmarking, tax incentive programs, and the national register. In the future, the Commission hopes to educate homeowners about local landmark districts.

This annual report has been prepared in fulfillment of the Village of Glen Ellyn’s annual reporting requirement under the National Park Service’s Certified Local Government Program established under the National Preservation Act. The Village of Glen Ellyn has been a “Certified Local Government” since 2004.

The Purpose

The Purpose of the Glen Ellyn Historic Preservation Commission is to encourage the rehabilitation and utilization of structures, places and works of art having a special *historic, architectural or aesthetic value* or interest to the community, and to identify those buildings and such worthy of designation as official Glen Ellyn landmarks.

Landmark Designations

The landmark designation process is initiated when a Glen Ellyn Local Landmark Nomination Form is submitted to the Village administrative offices. The structure being proposed for landmarking must be at least 50 years old and each nomination must provide substantial evidence that it meets at least two of the following criteria:

- Its integrity of location, design, materials and workmanship make it worthy of preservation or restoration; or
- Its value as an example of the architectural, cultural, economic, historic, social or other aspect of the heritage of the Village of Glen Ellyn, the State of Illinois, or the United States; or
- Its certain distinguishing characteristic of architecture is inherently valuable for the study of a time period, type of property, method of construction or use of indigenous materials; or
- Its location as a site of an important archaeological, significant historic, or natural event; or
- Its identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to architectural, cultural, economic, historic, social or other aspect of the development of the Village of Glen Ellyn, the State of Illinois, or the United States; or
- It be one of the few remaining examples of a particular architectural style; or
- Its exemplification of an architectural type or style distinguished by innovation, rarity, uniqueness or overall quality of design, detail, materials or craftsmanship; or
- Its identification as the work of an architect, designer, engineer or builder whose

individual work is significant in the history or development of the Village of Glen Ellyn, the State of Illinois, or the United States; or

- Its representation of an architectural, cultural, economic, historic, social or other theme expressed through distinctive areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art or other objects that may or may not be contiguous; or
- Its unique location or distinctive physical appearance or presence representing an established and familiar visual feature of a neighborhood, community or the Village.

Each nomination is required to be submitted along with historic photographs or property information relevant to each case. Once a nomination form is submitted, the Commission will host a public hearing to consider recommending such designation to the Village Board of Trustees. If the landmark is granted the Village issues the property owner a plaque to display on the structure. All costs associated with landmarking are absorbed by the Village and come at no cost to the property owner.

Since 1992, the Commission has recommended approval of 43 landmark designations and 3 National Register Historic Districts (one residential and two in the Central Business District) to the Village Board of Trustees.

Some of the Village's most notable landmarks include: the Orrin D. Dodge house at 542 Hillside Avenue, which was lived in by Orrin Dodge, a prominent figurehead in the Village during the early 1920s; Charles Kerr, founder of Kerr Publishing in Chicago, built and lived in the home at 566 Hillside Avenue; the home at 525

Forest Avenue was built by Amos Churchill, a prominent builder in the community during the early 1900s and lastly, the Glen Ellyn Horse Trough is a cast iron trough that was donated to the Village in 1907 by prominent figurehead William Newton.

In September of 2019 the Commission reviewed the landmark nomination of 475 Hawthorne Boulevard and made a preliminary determination that the property qualified for landmarking. In November of 2019 the Commission held a public hearing for the landmarking of 475 Hawthorne Boulevard and

made a recommendation to the Village Board to designate the property as a landmark. After Village Board approval, 475 Hawthorne Boulevard became the 43rd property in to be landmarked.

The Commission received a request from the owner of 250 Anthony Street to remove the landmark status on their property. A number of updates to the home will likely require extensive work on the home, and the owner did not want barriers to being able to fix the property as needed. The Commission was able to provide resources for the home owner to contact in order for the work to be done in an historically appropriate way. The owner ultimately decided not to move forward with the request to rescind the landmark status on the home.

Please see the next couple of pages for the complete list of Glen Ellyn landmarks. Note, there have not been any landmark nominations that were rejected by the Commission, nor are there any landmark applications pending at this time.

Landmark Spotlight

This Dutch Colonial home at 475 Hawthorne Boulevard was built in the 1920s. The home includes original windows, a detached garage, and lush landscaping across the property. This is the most recent home in the Village to be landmarked.

Committee Activity

Certificates of Appropriateness

The Village of Glen Ellyn Historic Preservation Commission granted a Certificate of Appropriateness (COA) for alterations to the landmarked property of the Glen Ellyn Civic Center located 535 Duane Street. The Commission reviewed a proposed parking garage on the property which, while on the same lot as the Civic Center, will not alter the Civic Center itself.

National Register Nominations

No national registry nominations were considered during this fiscal year.

Monitoring

The Village of Glen Ellyn Historic Preservation Commission did not provide any comments on alterations or demolitions to National Registry or Illinois Registry properties. The Commission did monitor preservation issues more generally including passing a resolution concerning a development adjacent to the national historic district.

Survey Activity

The Village of Glen Ellyn has conducted five Architectural Resource Surveys within the northern portions of the community since 2002. The Village has conducted these surveys for several purposes including:

- Expansion of the Village's body of data on existing historic homes;
- Creation of residential interest in preservation;
- Encouragement of homeowners to consider local landmarking;
- Encouragement of homeowners to apply for property tax freeze, available for restoration

projects on historic properties;

- Maintenance of the Certified Local Government Status achieved by the Village in 2004, and the access to federal funding for historic preservation efforts that comes with the designation;

To date, the Village has conducted five surveys that have examined approximately 60% of the Village's residential properties. Approximately 54.8% of the homes surveyed are either contributing or significant architectural or historic structures. These surveyed areas include some of the earliest subdivisions within Glen Ellyn, and contain several significant and potentially significant buildings.

Annual Awards

Upon recommendation of the Historic Preservation Commission, the Village gave five historic preservation awards and two certificates of appreciation to properties in the Village.

Historic Horse Trough

A replica of the historic horse trough was created in bronze and installed at the Main Street and Crescent Boulevard intersection. The landmarked/original horse trough was relocated to the Civic Center where it will be preserved for years to come. The original structure was sustaining damage in its previous location at the busy intersection.

Committee Activity Timeline

- August – Meeting cancelled
- September – The Commission made a preliminary determination for the landmark application of 475 Hawthorne and made a preliminary approval for Exterior Alteration to the landmarked property at 535 Duane Street for the construction of the Glen Ellyn Civic Center parking garage.
- October – Meeting cancelled.
- November – The Commission held a public hearing regarding a landmark application for the home at 475 Hawthorne Boulevard. The Commission also discussed text amendments to the Village Code to improve the landmarking process. The Commission eliminated the requirement for a separate preliminary determination meeting and will now make the determination of landmark eligibility and the Commission's recommendation on landmarking in the same meeting.
- December – Meeting Cancelled.
- January – The Commission held a public hearing concerning rescinding landmark status for the home at 253 Anthony Street. The Commission also discussed the 2020 Historic Preservation Commission goals and the May historic preservation month event.
- February – The Commission adopted the Commission's 2020 goals. The Commission then discussed the upcoming historic preservation awards and May, historic preservation month event.
- March – Meeting cancelled due to Covid-19 public health disaster.
- April – Meeting cancelled due to Covid-19 public health disaster.
- May – Meeting and annual Historic Preservation Month event cancelled due to the ongoing Covid-19 public health disaster.
- June – The Commission met remotely using Zoom as a platform, to hold the annual historic preservation awards. The commission reviewed projects completed in 2019 and made recommendations to the Village Board for this year's winners.
 - Restoration of the Year Award – 431 Carleton Avenue
 - Remodel of the Year Award – 684 Grand Avenue and 388 North Montclair Avenue
 - Streetscape Compatibility Award – 655 Pleasant Avenue
 - Architectural Details Award – 689 Lake Road
 - Certificates of Appreciation - 680 Grand Avenue and 205 Crest Road
- July – Meeting cancelled due to Covid-19 public health disaster.

Discussion of Goals and Budgetary Requests for 2021 Fiscal Year

Background:

In February 2020 the Historic Preservation Commission adopted a list of 10 goals to work towards through the year. Many of these goals, such as the annual Historic Preservation Month event, will likely require funding. As the Village prepares its 2021 budget, the Historic Preservation Commission may wish to request funding for specific activities.

The Goals the Commission adopted for 2020 are listed below.

1. Continue to encourage landmarking of Village residences and commercial buildings by generating ongoing print and media coverage to promote local landmark designations and follow up with direct mailings and neighborhood meetings for possible designees.
2. Create a list that includes homes that have both a) received a historical plaque from the Historical Society within the last three years, and b) are considered significant homes. Contact these homeowners for interest in Landmark status with a letter and work to improve response rates.
3. Promote heritage tourist activities such as self-guided tours of local landmarked properties with a paper map or pamphlet that highlights 10 properties along Main Street from Stacy's Corners to the north edge of Downtown.
4. Explore the establishment of local Glen Ellyn Landmark Districts.
5. Work more closely with the Chamber of Commerce and other groups to actively promote Glen Ellyn History and Stacy's Tavern Museum to the benefit of all and explore additional partnerships with other local agencies engaged with historic preservation.
6. Explore various social media strategies to further promote public outreach for landmarking homes.
7. Encourage younger generations to participate and engage in historic preservation through such events as trivia nights at local establishments. Create activities for Preservation Month in May that will further promote historic preservation to younger generations.
8. Promote Historic Preservation in public spaces. Work with the Village to display educational information and Historic Preservation guidelines in public buildings and venues.
9. Partner with other groups, where appropriate, to promote historic preservation at events, such as the North Main Street Neighborhood block party.
10. Start a dialogue with community members, including realtors, through an informal "coffee with the commission" type event.

Commission Action:

The Historic Preservation Commission is being asked to discuss potential funding requests for the Village's 2021 budget. Funding requests must be for specific activities and list reasons why funding is needed and specifically what it will be used for.
